

Qatar pulls troops

ANKARA/DOHA, June 14, (Agencies): Turkey said on Wednesday Qatar's rift with fellow Gulf Arab states and Egypt was damaging the Islamic world and it would do all it could by diplomatic channels to prevent any escalation.

President Tayyip Erdogan, who has cultivated close ties to Doha while preserving relations with Saudi Arabia, dispatched his foreign minister to Doha in a bid to solve a dispute raising concern across the Middle East and beyond. Saudi Arabia, Egypt, the United Arab Emirates and Bahrain have broken off ties and imposed sanctions on Qatar, accusing it of supporting terrorism and courting regional rival Iran — allegations Doha denies.

"Our main priority as part of our efforts with both Qatar and Saudi Arabia and other Gulf countries is to solve this through negotiations, not to escalate the crisis," Erdogan's spokesman Ibrahim Kalin told an Ankara news conference.

KUWAIT CITY, June 14: A governmental committee will be formed soon to deal with social media users who spread rumors, attack other countries or incite sectarianism and sedition, reports Al-Qabas daily quoting a high-ranking

According to the source, members of the committee include representatives from the ministries of Interior, Foreign Affairs, Information and Awgaf.

He said the committee will scrutinize posts on social networking sites and other media platforms to identify those trying to ignite sedition and sectarianism or attack personalities and policies in other countries.

He revealed the Interior Ministry will be in charge of monitoring all social media accounts and refer those proven to have committed violations to the judiciary, while the Information Ministry will form a team tasked to follow up violations in electronic and print media and then refer erring individuals to the Public Pros-

On the other hand, the Ministry of Awqaf will monitor religious sermons and discussions, as well as encourage religious personalities to promote unity and warn against discord. Preachers are not allowed to talk about politics in their sermons, the source added.

He said the Foreign Affairs Ministry will continue playing its diplomatic roles abroad to help address rifts in the Arabian Gulf.

Meanwhile, another security source disclosed that Internet patrols are closely monitoring social networking and microblogging sites

Sanders supporter shoots rank Republican

ALEXANDRIA, Virginia, June 14, (AP): A rifle-wielding attacker opened fire on Republican lawmakers at a congressional baseball practice Wednesday, wounding House GOP Whip Steve Scalise of Louisiana and several others as congressmen and aides dove for cover. The assailant, prepared with "a lot of ammo," fought a gun battle with police before he, too, was shot

and later died. Scalise dragged himself off the infield leaving a trail of blood as colleagues rushed to his assistance. A government official identified the shooter as James. T. Hodgkinson of Illinois. The official was not authorized to discuss the investigation by name and spoke on condition of anonymity.

Shortly after the shooting, Bernie Sanders, the former candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, said on the Senate floor that the shooter apparently was a volunteer for his campaign last year. Sanders said he denounced the violence "in the strongest possible terms.'

Brotherhood's double standards not strange

LAST WEEK, the Turkish authority decided to start the process of withdrawing the citizenship of 130 people who are Turkish from their fathers and grandfathers

The decision to withdraw their citizenship is not because they acquired it fraudulently, and not even due to their dual citizenship. The decision is based mainly on not

being in good with terms the politics of Turkish President 'Najmudeen Erdogan'.

Among those whose citizenship is under threat of withdrawal is prominent opposition

figure Fethullah



Gülen who has been accused of masterminding the failed coup which occurred in mid-June last year – almost a year ago. Also, there are two MPs from the

Republican People's Party that support the Kurds.

The Turkish style of citizenship withdrawal is followed by a threemonth ban on three opposition members from returning to Turkey. It is known that they will be sent to Turkish jails upon their return through captious rulings until destiny emerges.

I am astonished by the 'cemetery silence' practiced by the allies of Erdogan, here I mean the Muslim Brotherhood Group. We have not heard any single statement of criticism or protest against the arrest of thousands of Erdogan's opponents and his policies up to now.

We wish that news on revoking the citizenship of more than a hundred persons from the anti-Erdogan group wakes them up from their administrative slumber. We remind them of their legends and hymns.

Here in Kuwait, the authorities revoked citizenship for legal reasons, because some of them obtained it fraudulently while others had dual citizenship. Others worked against the principles upon which the State is based. Some revolted and continue to do so despite the reinstatement of withdrawn citizenship in exchange for parliamentary political deals for reasons which are still unknown to us the observers.

But this is not our issue here. Our issue is about the not surprising duality in principled positions practiced daily by those affiliated to the doctrine of the Muslim Brotherhood.

Gülen has been living in the United States since 1999 to evade judicial arrest, because the authorities that plotted the coup in Turkey in 1997 are looking for him. Reason behind the animosity of the
